

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


The Celebrant proceeds

Holy and gracious Father: In your infinite love you made us for yourself, and, when we had fallen into sin and become subject to evil and death, you, in your mercy, sent Jesus Christ, your only and eternal Son, to share our human nature, to live and die as one of us, to reconcile us to you, the God and Father of all. 



A Note on the Liturgical Panels Mako Fujimura

The white Easter panels are done with crushed oyster shell pigments (Japanese technique of "Gofun") on Belgium Portrait Linen. These are meant to read as "innerscape" of our journey as we, like the Magi, look to the stars to find Christ. At Epiphany, the panels are "closed" but in Easter they are opened, revealing the fragments of pure gold in between the paintings. In the morning or afternoon light, the cracks emanate golden light, to indicate Christ's triumphant resurrection and the empty tomb. At this time of the year, the "slice" of light from the spring sun moves through the panels (early in the morning casting the shadows of the "cross" over the left panels), adding another dimension to consider for our post-Resurrection journey into the New.

St. Augustine's Corner

We continue our Easter journey with music today, expressed in the lessons and preaching, and supported by hymns, service music, psalm, and solo. Begun two weeks ago with Resurrection/Easter Sunday, Eastertide (or Paschal tide) is a 50 day journey which accounts for the times Jesus appeared to his disciples before he ascended into heaven. Like Epiphany, it is a season of miracles and light, made manifest to us through works and signs. Liturgically, this is expressed in white altar paraments, the return of the Gloria in Excelsis (Hymn of Praise) and a Fraction Anthem (from the Lenten Kyrie and Agnus Dei), the response of repeated 'Alleluia,' and in joyous hymns and psalms. This continues through to our next feast of Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit was given to the Apostles. Today marks "Good Shepherd Sunday, where we find this image in the lessons, most prominently in the psalm of the day.

Continuing this theme, we also offer another setting of Psalm 23, the sing-songy setting of "The Lord is my Shepherd" by contemporary British composer Howard Goodall. This anthem was made famous being paired as theme song to the British comedy "The Vicar of Dibley" which featured a woman vicar in a rural community, traversing the religious and political landscape there with grace and laughs. It is a series about coming together and commonality. The piece reflects this in its tuneful solos, sung by treble, and gentle lilting lines reflected by the choir. This is all supported by a rippling organ accompaniment.

For the prelude and communion music, we take excerpts from the monumental Baroque Era oratorio, Messiah, of George Frederick Handel. The work needs no introduction, however, worth mentioning, that the premier was during Lent, in preparation for Holy Week in March of 1742. This is contrary to the usual usage around the Advent and Christmas holiday season, when many performances now take place. Today, we hear music pertaining to the shepherds in the first part. The prelude is the 'Pifa', or pastoral symphony, which is program music meant to paint of the picture of shepherds tending their flocks. It is in a slow dance meter, yet joyous in its lilt and sunny C-Major signature. The duet at communion is a series of two solos, knitting Old Testament and New Testament texts together. Set for alto and soprano, the music of comfort again is in a slow pastoral dance, again, evoking imagery of the shepherds on their way to Bethlehem. Our context today is the image of Jesus as the Good Shepherd.
